### Bolshoi online

The Bolshoi Theatre has closed its 244 season with the online screening of the opera Sadko.

On May 11 the Bolshoi Theatre of Russia finished the second series on online screenings of the previously recorded productions from its Golden Collection on YouTube. Together with Google and Mezzo HD, the last premiere of the season was shown which took place shortly before the introduction of restrictive measures due to the coronavirus pandemic and was scheduled to be performed also at the beginning of May — was the opera Sadko by Nikolai Rimsky-Korsakov.

The production staged by Dmitri Tcherniakov was presented to the global audience on the director's birthday — on May 11 Tcherniakov marked his 50th birthday.







On May 13, Wednesday, Director General of the Bolshoi Theatre of Russia Vladimir Urin addressed to the theatre workers with a letter informing them that the 244 theatre season is closing ahead of time due to continuing restrictions caused by the coronavirus pandemic.

"Dear colleagues and co-workers of the Bolshoi!

In discharge of my promise to inform you about our further life as soon as possible, I address you once again.

I am sure you watch the situation in the world, in Russia and in Moscow, attentively. So you must be aware that no cultural institutions of our capital will work in the near future.

Having discussed and taken into account all circumstances in place, we agreed on the following: we have to finish our 244 season now.

From June 1 the major part of the company goes on their annual vacation (this makes 56 days for art professionals.) I think that nobody would risk making

any prognosis concerning the further development of the situation. I hope that we will get a certain vision by the end of July and an understanding of what our future might be. I want to believe that by that time we will gain the opportunity to resume our rehearsals and start preparing for performances..."


Tchaikovsky and the history of the Bolshoi are inseparable. It is here where Swan Lake was heard for the first time and The Sleeping Beauty and The Nutcracker are also still performed. Four operas by Tchaiovsky were staged at the Bolshoi for the first time: Voyevoda, Eugene Onegin, Mazeppa and Cherevichki. Undine - the only opera by Tchaikovsky which has never been fully performed - can be counted among them, too, although with certain reservations. It was at the Bolshoi where its fragments were performed for the first time.



# Press analysis:

Russian mass media

Major media widely covered the screening of the last premiere of the season of the Bolshoi.

TASS (May 11) announced the screening of Nikolai Rimsky-Korsakov's opera Sadko and published fragments of a short interview with its director Dmitri Tcherniakov who accepted congratulations from the agency on his birthday.

A Birthday In Self Isolation.

"I will gladly hold an online dialogue with the audience before the Sadko screening," said Dmitri Tcherniakov... "Yet I haven't decided if I will watch the screening... I know this production inside and out. If I start watching the screening and something goes wrong, I will get nervous... — I am used to controlling my productions..."

According to his words, he is much calmer about his birthday. "I have marked my birthday only a few times in my life," Tcherniakov confessed. "And now I decided to celebrate the 50th birthday like all normal people, invite about a hundred guests, arrange a grand

affair. But everything was cancelled. /.../ Yet I don't feel sad, I don't permit myself this weakness, I feel good in isolation, it gives me some productive peace. I can look out the window for long, read long novels, feel the life around me properly. Generally, I try to stay positive..."

And though he treats his 50th birthday, as he says, like a "number" first of all, still he could not help admitting that he came to this Rubicon with considerable achievements./.../

"The multiple award winner of the Golden Mask, double laureate of the international prize The Opera Awards, innovator in live and on stage, Russian opera director Dmitri Tcherniakov has turned 50 on May 11," <a href="Argumenty Nedeli">Argumenty Nedeli</a> reports. The newspaper congratulates the director on his birthday and publishes several congratulations from his colleagues.

Artistic director of the Maly Drama Theatre (The Theatre of Europe) of St Petersburg, theatre director Lev Dodin:

"I was lucky: I saw one of the early, one of the first productions by Dmitri Tcherniakov — The Double Inconstancy by Marivaux at the small stage of Globus Theatre in Novosibirsk. And I saw it just in Novosibirsk, on that very stage, having not known even the name of Dmitri Tcherniakov yet. I remember how amazed I was by his surprisingly consistent aspiration to elegant perfection, to precision, to completeness, to the style of the form and its connection with the sense... All those qualities were very rare then for modern theatre, for contemporary young directors. Admittedly, they are still quite rare for the theatre nowadays. This production was nominated for the Golden Mask and I saw how happy the theatre actors were, both featured in the production and not, how they cheered. /.../"

Intendant of Opéra de Lyon, director of Bavarian Opera Serge Dorny:

"Dmitri Tcherniakov is an incredibly interesting director. Or I'd rather say, extremely inquisitive one. Be it his Don Giovanni, Onegin or Sadko, he gives these works a new topicality, a new vision. And his interpretation

never leaves us indifferent, it lingers for a long time. Art is not for statement, art is to ask questions, and Tcherniakov's theatre is the one that asks them. Dear Dmitri! I congratulate you on your birthday! In these strange and incomprehensible times I contemplate everything you gave us. About your exceptional creative work and, as Oscar Wilde said, 'with winter wisdom comes'. And I am waiting only for the future. The future together with you and the one of many projects we will share with you. I wish you happy birthday on this remarkable day!"

Director of Paris Opera Stéphane Lissner sends his congratulations:

"My dear Dima, happy birthday!

I consider you to be one of the greatest directors of our days! It was you who managed to become a person capable of opening great Russian and world opera masterpieces — and first of all Russian operas - to the world though your work with dramaturgy, with actors, through your intelligence and interpretation. On Tuesday, April 12, the General Director of the Bolshoi Theatre of Russia Vladimir Urin expressed his gratitude via TASS agency to Russian government and Ministry of Culture for their financial support of culture institutions and the Bolshoi Theatre in particular which have been forced to suspend their work completely in the situation of the coronavirus pandemic.

"I know it firsthand that the Ministry of Culture has actively stood for the cultural sphere before the government, and we are grateful to the relevant agency for it," Urin noted. "We speak about money meant to provide salaries, building maintenance and housing services. These payments come from state subsidies and partly from the income of the culture institution itself." "Currently the Bolshoi has no income at all," stated the head of the theatre.

Earlier, on May 10, we learned that the Russian government doled out 3.8 billion roubles to the Ministry of Culture, the Bolshoi Theatre of Russia and State Hermitage to provide support after the suspension of the work of culture institutions.

Following the Decree of the Moscow Governor, the work of all theatres in the capital was suspended. The Decree efficacy was prolonged till May 31.

Director of the Bolshoi Ballet Makhar Vaziev told <u>Gazeta.Ru</u> about how the dancers and tutors of the Bolshoi work during the pandemic period — an article Artists Throughout The World Unite And That Gives Hope.

"In there difficult conditions they have self organised and train actively at home. Our tutors and concertmasters hold classes on Zoom — Gennadi Yanin, Alexander Vetrov, Nadezhda Grachyova. It can be that in the morning the artists train with one tutor and in the evening with another. Online gives us an opportunity to 'attend' classes all over the world. I know that some artists train with a tutor from San-Francisco at 8 pm. Artists from Mariinsky Theatre connect to our tutors. Of course, such a moment of general unity and solidarity gives strength, faith and hope. /.../ I do not control artists in any way — now we don't have the purpose of a performance within five days where everybody should be perfectly fit. Still, some of them send their videos and ask what I think. I say: 'I don't believe, perhaps it's a paste-up.' They are doing some technique miracles there. Turn three pirouettes en dedans, move into en dehors and turn another three. I've never seen them doing something like this in the theatre!"

Head of the Perspective Planning and Special Projects Department of the Bolshoi Irina Chernomurova speaks about the forced suspension of the cultural life, current challenges, plans and prospects on <u>Classical-musicnews.ru</u>. Besides Irina Chernomurova, heads of different theatre and music companies answered questions from the publication. The big article was titled A Compulsory Standby.

"How does the theatre cope with the forced suspension? What are the casualties?"

"The Bolshoi Theatre went to the quarantine at the height of work. The ballet company had just entered full dress run-throughs of two one-act ballets created by local choreographers Anton Pimonov and the young Arte-

my Belyakov specially for our theatre. Performance cycles with guest soloists ended almost immediately, and the opera administration revised all casts for a month and a half ahead when the process of the borders closing started. The opera was ready to resume performances without guest soloists from abroad if the quarantine would not last long. Thankfully, our opera company has rejuvenated in recent years and now there are world class soloists and many talented young singers. We kept hoping that maybe we would begin rehearsing the new version of Don Giovanni. Hoped, we would be able to rehearse at least. Yet life has made its harsh adjustments. Now everybody sees that we'll return back to work no sooner than the end of summer. I mean rehearsals and classes first of all — a theatre simply dies without continuous professional training.

The bigger part of an iceberg, as we know, stays under water. And we are the same, the 'underwater part' makes up three-quarters of all work and this part is crucial for all — artists, choir and orchestra. Otherwise we cannot lift the curtain before the audience at any of our three stages. /.../"

<u>Narodnye Novosti</u> publishes an interview with the Bolshoi press secretary Katerina Novikova. The publication asked her to comment on the future of the theatre's online programme after easing and the complete lifting of the self isolation regime for artists and spectators.


"I think, the programmes will not continue in their current scope. We have screenings in cinemas all over the world several times a year. Before the pandemic, thousands of people in cinemas in different countries watched us. And on the same day in Russia our productions stayed available for the Russian audience for 24 hours for free. So we have just altered our schedule a bit. And now we are showing the same screenings, recorded previously. And we are doing it for free not only in Russia but all over the world. Later, I think, we will keep on working in our previous mode. I want to believe in it," said Katerina Novikova.

"Mikhail Shvydkoi: how to save the international cultural space during the pandemic" — the special representative of the RF president for international cultural cooperation told <a href="Vesti.Ru">Vesti.Ru</a> "about how Russia is preparing an unprecedented online marathon on the UNESCO platform. We want to arrange in on the UNESCO platform with the participation of Kultura TV channel, OKKO, Medici, Arte, Mezzo. And there will also be a kind of cross-talk between the heads of culture institutions."

Alexei Ratmansky, artistic director of the Bolshoi Ballet of that time, noticed the beginner dancer, graduate of Moscow Ballet Academy, immediately and Lantratov's career rocketed. Now he dances all leading roles of the Bolshoi current repertoire."

Artemy Belyakov: Holding Onto A Wardrobe Or A Sofa... The Bolshoi principal dancer told <u>Moskovsky Komsomolets</u> how dancers are saving their profession while in self isolation:

"The premiere of your ballet Seasons to music by Glazunov was scheduled for the end of March but then cancelled due to the pandemic..."

"Yes the production was ready to be shown and just at the moment we were having dress rehearsals this situation with the quarantine happened. We still hoped then that we would be able to show it in May when the second performance series of this production

was scheduled, just on those days, yet we did not realize the scale of the events. Given how it is developing now, of course, it is strange to make any forecasts. Yet the general director Vladimir Georgievich Urin has assured everyone that the premieres will take place and everything will be shown when the theatre is accessible for the audience. For me, of course, the situation was very unpleasant, there's nothing to hide. Because much effort was put in this work and not only mine as a choreographer but those of the dancers, too. The last run-through with leading couples of Daria Khokhlova and Mark Chino, Angelina Vlashinets and Ivan Alexeev was just marvellous. /.../ My ballet features many classy casts... Including the leading dancers of the Bolshoi: it was a great pleasure to work with Olga Smirnova and Jacopo Tissi too."



"The artist was so great that practically every work he made became a masterpiece, whether it was a book illustration, a landscape, a special image of Versailles or the design of famous ballet productions. The talent, which in its time helped him become the ideologist of the Mir Isskustva group and the art director of the most well-known theatrical tours — Russian Seasons — is told by the video of the First Channel.

/.../ The rarest chronicle of the beginning of the 20th century — the Russian ballet in Paris. Tours spanning one and a half decades — from 1906 to 1924. The organiser — Sergei Diaghilev, the main ideologist and inspirational force — Alexander Benois. The foreigners were shaken by the synthesis of music, dance, light and art. For the first time, stage settings became legitimate art forms. People were even eager to buy designs for costumes of Le Pavillon d'Armide as big pictures.

"He joined the art aspect of the performance with natural theatrical effects. This way, during the second act, the stage had an actual fountain, and the splash of the falling water worked in harmony with the music of Tcherepnin" says the general director of Bakhrushin Museum Dmitry Rodionov.

But everything started quietly. At the end of the 19th century the young lawyer Alexander Benois arrives in Versailles to make sketches. A series of unconventional forms is born. Versailles will become one of the most important themes of his life. And a coveted trophy for collectors all around the world. The first to buy the drawings was the patron Tretyakov. /.../

..In 1926, being an "obsolete figure of the old world", Alexander Benois leaves Russia. He will go on to stage performances in Paris, he will be invited to Teatro alla Scala, cinematographers will bury him in work. But the enormous work The History of Art of All Ages and Peoples will stay unfinished. 117 diaries still await their researcher..."


